







The Public Sector Equality Duty (introduced through the Equality Act 2010) requires public bodies to have due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations between people when carrying out their activities. The Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Review 2019 – 2023 found that homelessness af ects people and communities differently within Crawley, a summary of which is included here.

- People who describe their ethnicity as black, mixed or from multiple ethnic groups, and other are overrepresented when compared with the population of Crawley, see Chart One. This is in part due to approaches from people relocating from other countries who wish to live in the UK, including former refugees and asylum seekers who have been granted permission to remain in the country.
